DON'T FORCE YOUR CHILD TO PURSUE A CERTAIN CAREER PATH

USE VARIOUS CAREER PATH TESTS

It is important to **understand your child three-dimensionally** by comparing and analyzing the results of various career path tests.



The more you know about your child, the easier it will be for you to have a career path conversation!

LEADING YOUR CHILD'S CAREER PATH THROUGH CONVERSATION

Help your child discover
who they are and
what they really want in
order for them to take
control of their lives.



DON'T TALK TO YOUR CHILD LIKE A JUDGE



What's wrong?



Is there any way to do it right?



Why did you do that?



Can you tell me the reason why you did that?

The way parents **ask their children questions** helps them grow as self-directed people.

QUESTIONS THAT DRIVE INTEREST EXPLORATION

Do you have any area that you want to know more in depth or that you find interesting?

What do you enjoy doing and feel happy about?

When you do something, do you enjoy being with people, or do you enjoy doing it alone?



Like this, you lead a career conversation with your child with **questions that arouse their interest.**

QUESTIONS TO HELP YOU DISCOVER TALENT

When you learned
or tried something,
what did you do
without difficulty?

What are your
strengths according
to those around
you?

Which subject do
you feel most
confident about? Why
are you confident in
that subject?

What are some
of the things you
enjoy doing that
are recognized by
others?



These questions help your **child**
learn about themselves and discover
what they like and are good at.



**Talk to your child right now openly and at
his/her eye level.**
